1.3. The Use of Zero Article (Ø)

▶ Ø (Zero Article)

• We use:

- Talk about things in general (all things everywhere)
 - I love watching whales! (All whales everywhere, not just one specific whale.)
 - . I love Italy.
- Countries
 - He's from Germany.
 - Have you visited Algeria?

Languages

- French
- . Japanese
- Meals
 - Breakfast
- People's names and titles
 - Prof., Dr Smith
- With possessives
 - My coffee ...
 - Her dog ...

- Uncountable nouns (unless referring to a specific example)

 - I love adding milk (uncountable) to my coffee (uncountable + possessive).
- **Specific mountains, lakes, and islands**
 - . Mt. Fuji
- Most cities, towns, streets, and airports
 - . Kiev
 - . New York
 - . Main Street

- zero article versus definite article (*the*): main usage

- The term 'zero article' refers to cases where no article is required. Use
- the zero article if you are talking about something in general and the noun is:
- 1. In the plural, e.g. *computers, books*.
- 2. Uncountable (e.g. *hardware*, *information*).
- 3. Abstract either singular countable or uncountable, e.g. *life*, *success*, *performance*.
- Note that:
- 4. Some words change meaning if they are used with or without *the*.
- 5. Titles to papers occasionally omit the article of the first noun. Both forms (i.e. with and without *the*) are common.
- 6. Captions to figures often omit the definite article.

without the	with the
She didn't want to be in hospital but she was too ill to go home. (in hospital means being there as a patient)	She didn't want to be in the hospital (in the hospital means being in the building)
When I was at school, we didn't have computers. (at school means being there as a student)	When I was at the school (at the school means being in the building)

▶ We don't use *the* with *bed* when we go there to sleep:

- I always go to bed at eleven o'clock. Not: I always go to the bed ...
- We don't use *the* before *work* when we talk about the place where we do our job:
- They go to work at 8 am every morning. Not: They go to the work ...

In, on at with time

I arrived on time.

Possessive expressions

We don't use *the* to refer to an individual's behaviour or to parts of an individual's body:

He spends most of **his** free time playing computer games.

Not: He spends most of the free time ...

► I must wash **my** hands.

Not: I must wash the hands.

► *This*, *that* and articles

I need this book

- We don't use *the* with plural nouns when we are referring to things in general:
- We have to protect wild animals. (referring to wild animals in general)
- Not: the wild animals.
- We don't use *the* when we refer in general to something abstract or uncountable:
- ▶ I love Japanese food. (all Japanese food/Japanese food in general)
- Not: *Hove the Japanese food*.

- We don't use *the* when the noun is not known to the listener or reader:
- Last Sunday, we saw **a** film called 'Nightmare'. (The
- *speaker doesn't think that the listener knows of this*
- ► film.)
- Not: ... we saw the film called 'Nightmare'.
- We don't use *the* instead of a possessive pronoun:
- *The police asked us to put our hands up.*
- Not: The police asked us to put the hands up.
